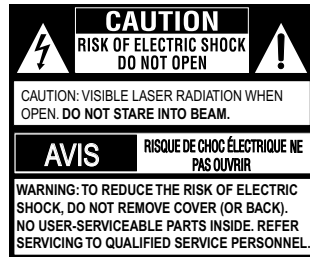

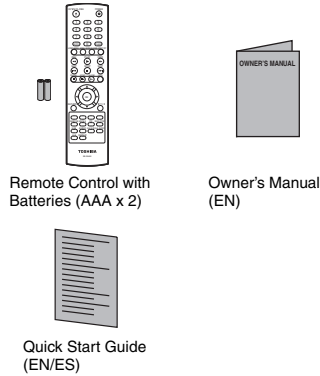

Features

Blu-ray Disc™

You can enjoy Blu-ray Disc™ which is capable of storing five times more data than a conventional DVD.

BD-Java

With some Blu-ray Disc™ which support Java applications, you can enjoy the interactive functions such as games or interactive menus.

BD-Live™

BD-Live™ (BD-ROM version 2 Profile 2.0) that allows interactive functions to be used when this unit is connected to the Internet in addition to the BONUSVIEW function. The various functions differ depending on the disc.

Full high-definition video playback

Watch movies in the highest picture quality available for your HDTV. This unit offers full high-definition video playback up to 1080p resolution for an amazing viewing experience. A highly detailed picture and increased sharpness delivers a more true-to-life picture.

DVD Upconversion for enhanced picture quality

Your current DVD will look even better than before thanks to video upconversion. Upconversion will increase the resolution of standard definition DVD to high definition up to 1080p over an HDMI connection. The picture will be less jagged and more realistic for a near high-definition experience.

Enjoy your content on different kinds of media

Full backwards compatibility with Blu-ray Disc™, DVD, CD and SD card ensures that you can continue to enjoy your current audio-video collection. Additionally, you can view JPEG digital pictures or listen to MP3 or Windows Media™ Audio music files.

PIP (BONUSVIEW™)

Some BD-videos have the PIP function which enables you to display the secondary video in the primary video. You can call up the secondary video by pressing **BONUSVIEW** whenever the scene contains the secondary video.

Pop-up menu

Some BD-video have pop-up menu which is a navigation menu that can be called up and be operated on the TV screen without interrupting the playback. You can call up the pop-up menu by pressing **POP/TOP** or **MENU**. Contents in the pop-up menu vary depending on the disc.

Playback of Content from an SD Memory Card

You can play back MP3 / WMA / JPEG files stored in an SD Memory Card. You can store picture-in-picture commentary, subtitles or other extras for BD-ROM ver. 2 (Profile 2.0 / Profile 1.1) files in an SD Memory Card and play back with the BD-video.

Playing back AVCHD files

This unit supports playback of AVCHD format files (new format for high definition video camcorders) recorded on disc. Your high definition personal archive is playable in HD quality.

x.v.Color®

This unit supports playback of video contents on discs recorded with "x.v.Color" technology. To watch this video content with the "x.v.Color", a TV or other display device supporting both video image reproduction using the "x.v.Color" standard and capable of manually switching its color setting is required. Please refer to the owner's manual of your display device for further information.

Blu-ray 3D Feature

This product can play 3D contents through an HDMI cable.

To implement the 3D effect, connect a 3D device (3D-compliant AV receiver, 3D-compliant TV) to the product using an HDMI cable, and play the 3D content while wearing 3D vision glasses.

Easy and simple connection to your HDTV via HDMI®

Connect this unit to your HDTV with one single HDMI (High-Definition Multimedia Interface) cable. It is recommended to use a High Speed HDMI Cable for better compatibility. The high definition video output signal will be transferred to your HDTV without conversion to analog signals, so you will get excellent picture and sound quality.

Thanks to other multiple outputs, you can also easily connect to your home theater system or amplifier.

HDMI® CEC (Consumer Electronics Control)

This unit supports HDMI CEC, which allows integrated system control over HDMI and is part of the HDMI standard.

HDMI 1080p/24F output (Blu-ray Disc™ only)

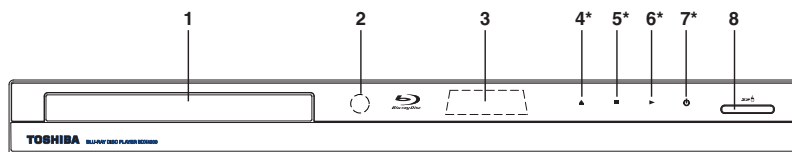

Copyright protection system

To play back the digital video images of a Blu-ray Disc™ / DVD via an HDMI connection, it is necessary that both the unit and the TV (or an AV amplifier) support a copyright protection system called HDCP (high-bandwidth digital content protection system). HDCP is copy protection technology that comprises data encryption and authentication of the connected AV device. This unit supports HDCP. Please read the operating instructions of your TV (or AV amplifier) for more information.

Identification of Controls

Front panel



(*) Notes:

1. These indicators are located in the sensor field.
2. When this unit is off, these indicators are dimmed. If a finger is brought close to the sensor field, the indicators will be invoked and light up.

1. Disc tray

2. Remote sensor

3. Display

4. OPEN/CLOSE indicator

- When invoked (white), tap to open/close the disc tray.

5. STOP indicator

- When invoked (white), tap to stop playback.

6. PLAY indicator

- When invoked (white), tap to start playback.

7. ON/STANDBY indicator

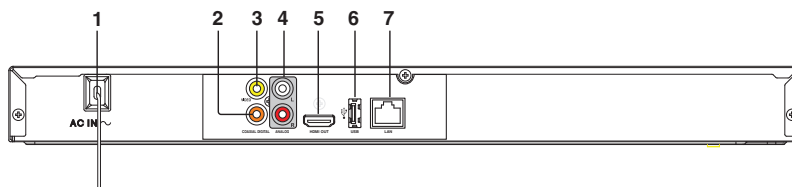
- When invoked (white), tap to turn on the unit, or to turn the unit into the standby mode. (To completely turn off the unit, you must unplug the AC power cord.)

8. SD card slot

How to Power On Your Unit ?

1. Connect to a standard AC outlet to supply power to this unit, the **ON/STANDBY** indicator lights in red and then turns white at once.
2. After about 10 seconds, the **ON/STANDBY** indicator will turn red automatically.
3. Touch the **ON/STANDBY** button to turn on the unit. The **ON/STANDBY** indicator will remain white (ON mode).

Rear panel



1. AC power cord

- Connect to a standard AC outlet to supply power to this unit.
- Unplug this cord from the AC outlet to completely turn off the unit.

2. COAXIAL DIGITAL AUDIO OUT jack

- Use to connect an AV receiver / amplifier, Dolby Digital / DTS decoder or other device with a coaxial digital audio input jack using a coaxial digital audio cable.

3. VIDEO OUT jack

- Use to connect a TV, an AV receiver or other device with a composite video cable.

4. ANALOG AUDIO OUT(L/R) jacks

- Use to connect a TV, an AV receiver / amplifier or other device with a composite audio cable.

5. HDMI OUT jack

- Use to connect a TV with an HDMI compatible port via an HDMI cable.

6. USB jack

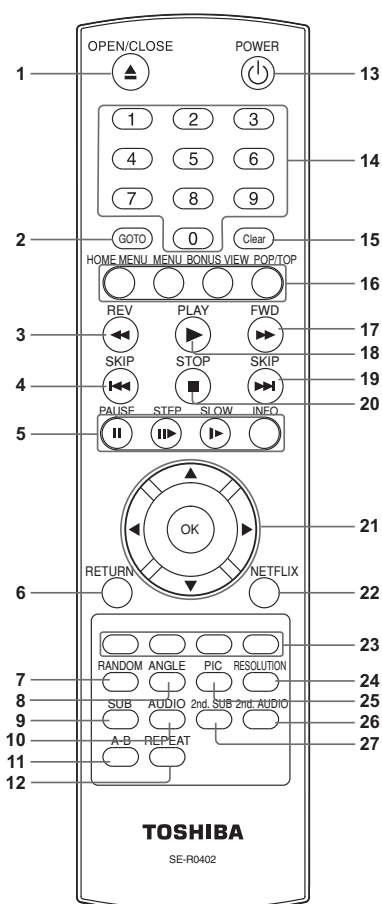

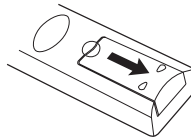

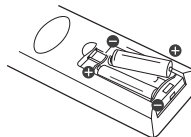
Installing batteries

Install the batteries (AAAx2) matching the polarity indicated inside battery compartment of the remote control.

1 Open the cover.



2 Insert batteries.



Make sure to match the + and – on the batteries to the marks indicated in the battery compartment.

3 Close the cover.


Caution: Never throw batteries into a fire.

Notes:

- Do not mix different battery types or combine used batteries with new ones.
- If the remote control does not operate correctly, or if the operating range becomes reduced, replace both batteries with new ones.
- If the batteries are dead or if you will not be using the remote control for a long time, remove the batteries to prevent battery acid from leaking into the battery compartment.

Operating with the remote control

Point the remote control at the remote sensor and press the buttons.



Distance:
About 5 m from the front of the remote sensor.

Angle:
About 30° in each direction of the front of the remote sensor.

* Do not expose the remote sensor of the Blu-ray Disc™ player to a strong light source such as direct sunlight or other illumination. If you do so, you may not be able to operate the Blu-ray Disc™ player via the remote control.

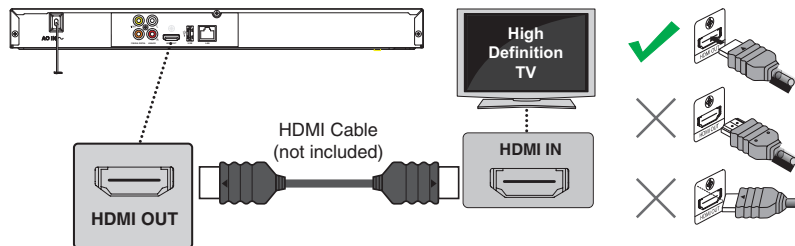
Notes:

- Direct the remote control at the remote sensor of the Blu-ray Disc™ player.
- When using the remote control, press the buttons at intervals of about 1 second to ensure the correct mode of operation.
- Do not drop or give the remote control a shock.
- Do not leave the remote control near an extremely hot or humid place.
- Do not spill water or put anything wet on the remote control.
- Do not open the remote control.
- If the remote control is not going to be used for a long time, remove the battery to avoid damage caused by battery leakage corrosion.

Connecting to a TV

Connect the Blu-ray Disc™ player to your TV.

Connecting to a TV using an HDMI® cable (Supports up to 1080i/1080p, 1080p/24F resolution.)

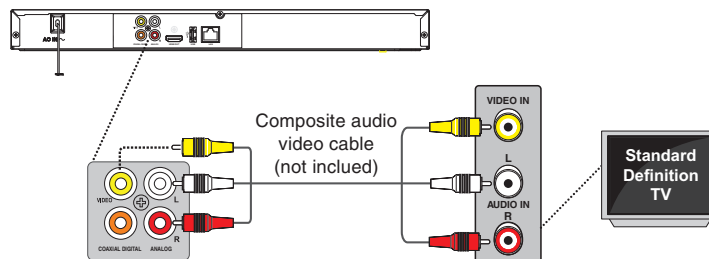


CONNECTIONS

Notes:

- To enjoy the viewing of 3D content, an HDMI connection with High Speed HDMI cable is required.
- Do not tilt the connector when inserting it into the HDMI jack, and make sure the shapes of the jack and the connector are matched.
- When using a non-HDCP compatible TV, the image will not display properly.
- An HDMI cable carries both video and audio signals. If you want to use TV speakers, you do not need to make an additional audio connection if you are using an HDMI cable.

Connecting to a TV using an A/V cable



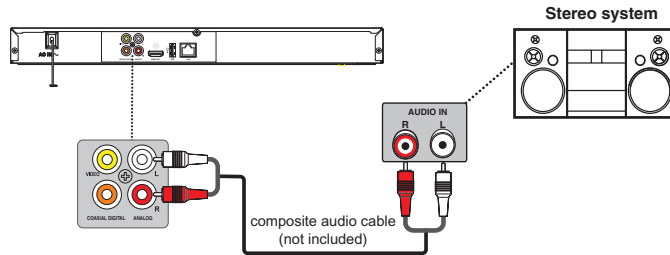
Notes:

- Refer to the owner's manual of the connected TV as well.
- When connecting to a TV using an HDMI cable, no video output.
- When you connect the DVD player to your TV, be sure to turn off the power and unplug both units from the wall outlet before making any connections.
- If your television set has one audio input, connect the left and right audio outputs of the DVD player to a Y cable adapter (not supplied) and then connect to your TV.

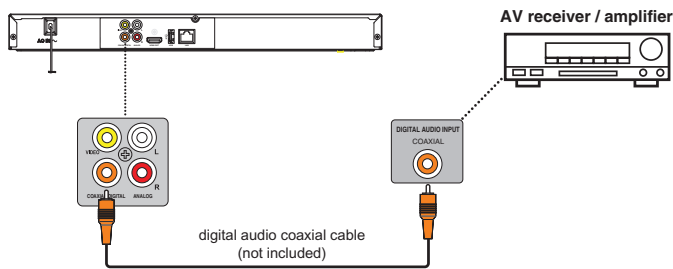

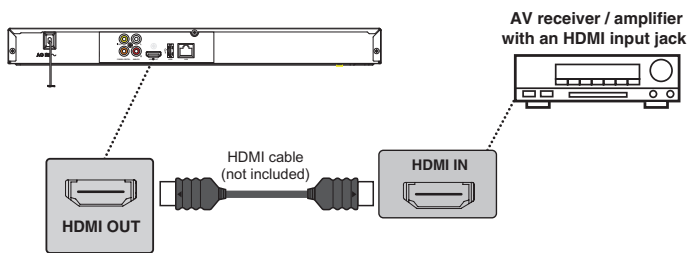

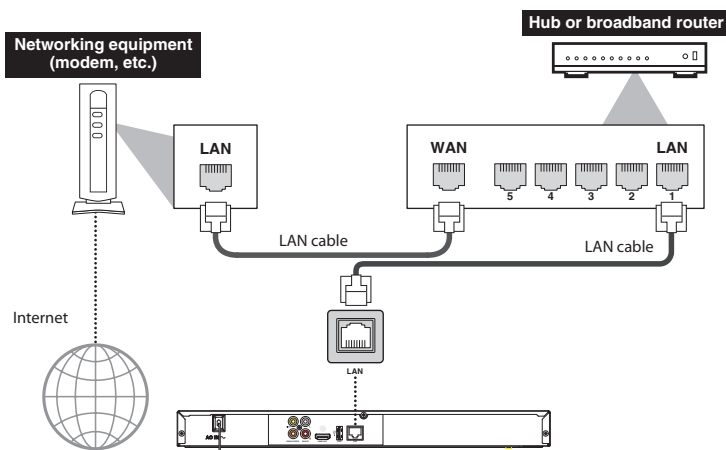
Wired Network Connection

Your Blu-ray Disc™ player can be connected to your home network:

- By connecting an Ethernet cable to the ETHERNET jack on the rear of your player and to a wired hub or router. Using a wired network provides the best performance, because the attached devices connect directly to the network and are not subject to radio frequency interference.

Connecting your player to a wired router

- Connect an Ethernet cable (CAT5 or better with RJ45 connector) to the ETHERNET jack on the back of your player and to an Ethernet jack on a hub or broadband router.

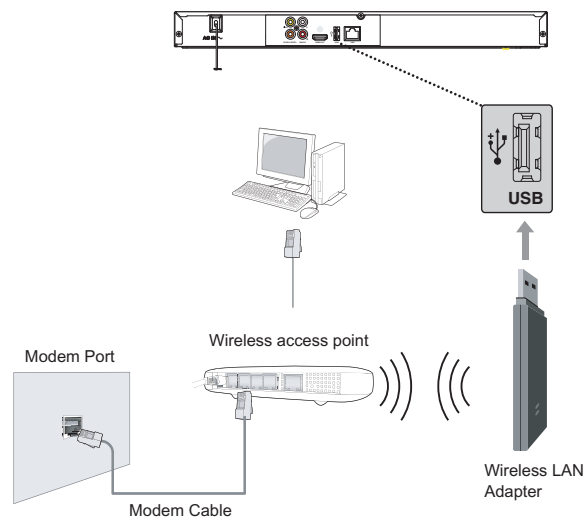
- Do not connect a modular phone cable to the ETHERNET jack.

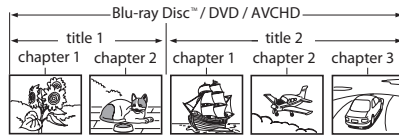

Structure of Disc/SD Card Contents

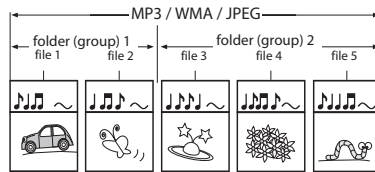



Basic playback

Preparations

- When you want to view a disc, turn on the TV and select the video input connected to the Blu-ray Disc™ player.

1	Press the POWER button.  The Blu-ray Disc™ player turns on.
2	Press OPEN/CLOSE.  The disc tray opens.
3	Place the disc on the disc tray.  With the playback side down
4	Press OPEN/CLOSE to close the disc tray.  Playback starts. <p>If you insert a Blu-ray disc or a DVD that contains a top menu, a menu may appear. Use ▼ / ▲ / ◀ / ▶ to select the title you want to view, then press OK to start playback.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• You may need to press the POP/TOP or MENU button to display disc menu (depending on the actual Blu-ray disc or DVD.)

■ To start playback in stop mode

Press **▶ PLAY**.

■ To pause playback (still mode)

Press **⏸ PAUSE** during playback.

To resume normal playback, press the **▶ PLAY** button.

- The sound is muted during still mode.

■ To stop playback

Press **■ STOP**. The home menu is displayed.

For Blu-ray discs, press **▼/▲** to select BD-ROM, then press **OK** to start playback at the beginning of the disc.


For DVDs/audio CDs, press **▶ PLAY** to resume normal playback.


- Depending on the disc, playback starts where it stopped or at the beginning of the disc.

- If you press **■ STOP** twice, playback stops completely. To start playback again, press **▶ PLAY**. Playback starts at the beginning of the disc.

■ To remove the disc

Press **OPEN/CLOSE**.

 Remove the disc after the disc tray opens completely.

 Be sure to press the **OPEN/CLOSE** button to close the disc tray after you remove the disc.

■ To turn the power off

Press **POWER** button to turn the unit off.


PLAYBACK

Variable Speed Playback

You can play discs at various speeds, and resume playback from the location where you stopped playback.

Playing in fast reverse / forward directions

Press **◀◀** or **▶▶** during playback.

 : **Fast forward playback**

 : **Fast reverse playback**

Each time you press this button, the fast-forward or fast-reverse speed changes in the following sequence:

**Fast x 2 → Fast x 4 → Fast x 8 → Fast x 16
→ Fast x 32 → Fast x 64 → Fast x 128.**

■ **To resume normal playback**


Press **▶ PLAY**.

Notes:

- The Blu-ray Disc™ player mutes sound and subtitles during reverse and forward scan.
- The playback speed may differ depending on the disc.

Playing frame by frame

Press **⏮** during still playback.

 Each time you press this button, the picture advances one frame.


■ **To resume normal playback**

Note: The sound is muted during frame by frame playback.

Playing in slow motion

Press **⏪** during playback.

 Each time you press this button, the slow-motion speed changes in the following sequence:

Slow x 1/2 → Slow x 1/4 → Slow x 1/8

■ **To resume normal playback**

Press **▶ PLAY**.

- The sound is muted during slow-motion playback.
- 3 speeds are available.

Locating a Desired Section

Normally, Blu-ray discs and DVDs are divided into titles, and the titles are sub-divided into chapters. Audio CDs are divided into tracks. You can quickly locate any specific title, chapter, or track.

Locating a title using the pop/top menu

1 Press **POP/TOP**.

 The pop/top menu appears on the TV screen.

2 Press **▼ / ▲ / ◀ / ▶** to select the title you want.

If the titles in the top menu are assigned a number, you can directly locate a specific title by pressing its designated number with the number buttons.

3 Press **OK**.

Playback starts from Chapter 1 of the selected title.

Locating a specific chapter or track



Press **◀◀** or **▶▶** repeatedly to access the chapter or track number you want.

Playback starts from the selected chapter or track.

To locate succeeding chapters or tracks.

Playback starts from the beginning of the current chapter or track. When you press twice in quick successions, playback starts from the beginning of the preceding chapter or track.

Note: Some titles may not display chapter numbers.

- The chapter, title or track repeat will be cleared when moving to another chapter, title, track / file or folder.
- Repeat playback does not function during A-B repeat playback.
- Chapter and title repeat are not available with some scenes.
- When the repeat setting is set for a MP3 or WMA folder (file), the repeat setting will be cancelled if you select other MP3 or WMA folder (file) to playback.

Repeating a specific segment

1 Press A-B at the desired starting point A during playback.



2 Press A-B at the desired ending point B during playback.



The Blu-ray Disc™ player automatically returns to point A and starts repeat playback of the selected segment (A-B).

For detailed operations, please follow the instructions in "Playing files on a data disc" on page 23.

■ Removing the SD card

In stop mode, gently push the SD card into the slot and then pull it out slowly.

Notes:

- If you cannot easily insert the memory card, you may have inserted it incorrectly. Try to turnover the card and then insert again. Do not force the memory card into the memory card slot.
- Do not remove the SD card during playback.

Using a USB Device

You can play MP3, WMA or JPEG files that have been stored on USB devices on the Blu-ray Disc™ player.

Operating a USB device

- 1** Inserting a USB device into the USB slot on the back of Blu-ray Disc™ player until it clicks.

- 2** In Home Menu, press ▼ / ▲ to select Media, and then press ►.

If no SD card or optical disc is inserted, the system will only show USB device.

■ Removing the USB device

In stop mode, gently pull the USB device out slowly.

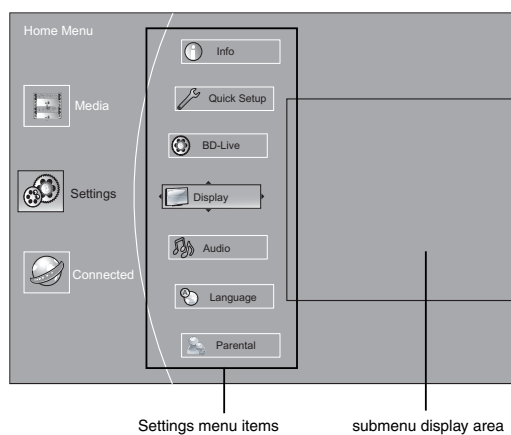

Customizing the Function Settings

In order to access BD-Live functions, the player must be properly configured for BD-Live internet access, and it must be equipped with additional memory.

1. In the main menu of **Settings**, press **►** button, then use **▲ / ▼** button to select **BD-Live**, then press **OK**.
2. Press **▲ / ▼** to select an option, and then press **OK**.
3. Use **▲ / ▼** to select the desired setting, and then press **OK** to confirm.
4. Press **◀** to go to the previous menu.

BD-Live Internet Access:

- **Limit Access** — Allows Internet access with valid "BD-Live" network access approval.
- **Always Allow Access** — Always allows BD-Live Internet access.
- **Prohibit Access** — Never allows BD-Live Internet access.

In order to set the player up for BD-Live Internet Access, perform the following steps:

1. In the main menu of **Settings**, press **►** button, then use **▲ / ▼** to select **BD-Live**, then press **OK**.
2. Press **▲ / ▼** to select "**BD-Live Internet Access**", and then press **OK**.
3. Use **▲ / ▼** to select the desired setting, and then press **OK** to confirm.
4. Make sure that "**Limit Access**" or "**Always Allow Access**" is checked.
5. Once the USB device or SD card has been inserted, if there is not at least 100Mbyte of free space on the device, you should choose "**Erase Blu-ray Storage**" from the BD-Live setup menu.

If your TV is an enhanced-definition TV (EDTV)	480p
If your TV is a standard-definition NTSC TV (American or Asian SD TV)	480i

Customizing the Function Settings

Notes:

- Selecting a resolution the TV does not support could result in an unstable picture or loss of the picture. See the documentation that came with the TV to find the resolutions the TV supports.
- Only the HDMI output on your player supports 1080p video output at any frame rate. If the TV is connected to the component output, the video output is limited to 1080i or lower.

TV Aspect:

16:9 wide, 16:9 Pillarbox, 4:3 Pan and Scan and 4:3 Letter Box are available for your choice.

Film Mode:

Movies are recorded on film at a rate of 24 pictures (frames) per second. Many of the movies on Blu-ray discs are placed on the discs at this frame rate. If your TV supports 24 frames per second, but you would prefer viewing the video at a higher frame rate, you should turn off Film Mode. **Off** selects a 60 frames/second output format.

Deep Color:

This option decides whether to turn off the Deep Color (color depth) setting for video signals output from the HDMI OUT jack.

Connecting the player and a TV that supports Deep Color allows more accurate color reproduction than when connecting it to a TV that does not support Deep Color. It is recommended to set this option **Off** if the picture is unstable or colors appear unnatural.

Bluray 3D Mode:

Select whether to play a Blu-ray Disc with 3D contents in 3D Mode.

Automatic: The 3D Blu-ray disc is played in 3D mode if your product detects a TV which supports it. It is played in 2D mode if your product detects a TV which can not support it.

Forced 2D: The 3D Blu-ray disc is played in 2D mode at all times. Select this option to view a picture without 3D effect or when a TV cannot support 3D Blu-ray discs.

Notes:

- If you or any viewer experiences the following symptoms or any other discomfort from viewing 3D video images, stop viewing and contact your health care provider:
Convulsions, Eye or muscle twitching, Loss of awareness, Altered vision, Involuntary movements, Disorientation, Eye Strain, Nausea/Vomiting, Dizziness, Headaches or Fatigue
- Carefully read instructions provided with your display and/or 3D glasses before 3D viewing.
- If you want to enjoy a 3D content, connect a 3D device (3D compliant AV receiver or TV) to the product and wear a 3D glass before playing the 3D content.
- While watching the 3D video, all analogue component and composite signals will be blocked automatically.
- All 3D signals are output only using the HDMI cable and through the HDMI OUT port.

- As the video resolution in 3D play mode is fixed according to the resolution of the original 3D video, you can not change the resolution to your preference.
- You must use a high-speed HDMI cable for a proper output of the 3D signal.
- You can not use this product for switching a 2D content to 3D.

Audio Setting

The settings in the Audio menu will configure the Blu-ray Disc™ player's digital audio outputs (**HDMI** or **Coaxial**).

1. In the main menu of **Settings**, press ► button, then use ▲ / ▼ button to select **Audio**, then press **OK** button.
2. Press ▲ / ▼ to select an option, and then press **OK**.
3. Use ▲ / ▼ to select your preferred audio items, and then press **OK** to confirm your selection.
4. Press ◀ to go to the previous menu.

PCM Downsampling:

If you don't have a surround sound receiver connected to the Blu-ray Disc™ player, you should leave the PCM downsampling to 48 kHz, and proceed to the next setup menu item. This is true regardless of whether the audio is connected to the TV with HDMI or the analog stereo outputs.

If you have a surround sound receiver connected to the Blu-ray Disc™ player, and you have connected to the surround receiver via the Blu-ray Disc™ player's analog multichannel audio outputs, this setting has no effect on the audio going to the analog outputs of the player. Leave the PCM downsampling to 48 kHz, and proceed to the next setup menu item.

If you have a surround sound receiver connected to the Blu-ray Disc™ player, and you have connected to the surround receiver via the Blu-ray Disc™ player's HDMI output, this setting has no effect on the audio going to the HDMI output of the player. **Leave the PCM downsampling to 48 kHz,** and proceed to the next setup menu item.

If you have a surround sound receiver connected to the Blu-ray Disc™ player via optical cable, set this menu item to the maximum PCM sampling rate that your surround receiver can accept (48 kHz or 96 kHz). **If in doubt, consult your surround receiver's manual or set to 48 kHz.**

NOTE: Incorrectly setting the digital audio output's PCM sampling rate too high may result in unpredictable audio playback.

Digital Output:

- **PCM Stereo** — Sets the output to PCM Stereo if you have not an audio receiver connected to your Blu-ray Disc™ player or the audio receiver connected to Blu-ray disc player is not a 5.1/7.1 channel receiver.
- **Bitstream HD** — Lets your player send Dolby TrueHD or DTS-HD MA bitstreams over HDMI (if your player is connected to a compatible HDMI audio receiver). If your

player is not connected to a compatible HDMI receiver (for example, your player is connected directly to the TV or your player is connected to an audio receiver using an optical cable), a compatible audio signal is automatically sent over the HDMI and optical connections. With this setting, Blu-ray audio is limited to the soundtrack for the main movie (no PIP audio).

- **Bitstream Legacy** — Sends a DTS or Dolby Digital bitstream from the disc over the HDMI and optical connections. Blu-ray audio is limited to the soundtrack for the main movie (no PIP audio).
- **Bitstream Mixed** — Sends a mixed (PIP audio and movie audio) DTS audio stream over the HDMI and optical connections. This mode is primarily intended for use when you want to hear both PIP audio and the movie audio.
- **PCM 5.1** — Sends a PCM audio signal of up to 5.1 channels over the HDMI connection and up to 2 channels over the optical connection.
- **PCM 7.1** — Sends a PCM audio signal of up to 7.1 channels over the HDMI connection and up to 2 channels over the optical connection.

Dynamic Range Control:

Dynamic Range Control means that you can allow the Blu-ray Disc™ player to make the loud parts of a movie's audio track quieter than they would be in the theatre, without making the dialog of the actors any quieter.

This would be useful, for instance, when you want to watch a movie in the evening when others might be sleeping.

NOTES: This setup menu item **has no effect** unless:

- The device playing the disc's audio (TV or surround audio receiver) is connected to the Blu-ray Disc™ player's analog audio outputs; OR
- you have selected "Bitstream Mixed" in the Blu-ray Disc™ player's audio setup menu.

When **Dynamic Range Control** is set to **Off**, movie soundtracks are played with the standard dynamic range.

When movie soundtracks are played at low volume or from smaller speakers, you can set **Dynamic Range Control** to **On**. Your player applies appropriate compression to make low-level content more intelligible and prevent dramatic passages from getting too loud.

Selecting the "**Auto**" option turns on the Dynamic Range Control for all Blu-ray Disc™ movie soundtracks except Dolby TruHD. If you have selected a TruHD track on the Blu-ray™ disc, the "auto" selection tells the Blu-ray Disc™ player to only turn on dynamic range control if information embedded in the TruHD sound track tells it to do so.

Stereo Downmix:

Select whether to downmix the multi-channel audio into fewer channels.

- **Auto** — Downmixes the multi-channel audio into the specific stereo that the connected equipment supports.

- **Stereo (LoRo)** — Downmixes the multi-channel audio into two channel stereo. Choose when the Blu-ray Disc™ player is connected to the equipment that does not support virtual surround function such as Dolby Pro Logic.
- **Surround Encoded (LIRt)** — Downmixes the multi-channel audio into surround compatible stereo. Choose when the Blu-ray Disc™ player is connected to the equipment that supports virtual surround function such as Dolby Pro Logic.

Language Setting

1. In the main menu of **Settings**, press **▲ / ▼** to select **Language**, and then press **OK**.
2. Press **▲ / ▼** to select **OSD, Menu, Audio** or **Subtitle**, and then press **OK**.

OSD:

This option enables you to select the on-screen menu language.

Menu:

This option lets you to select the disc menu language.

Notes:

- Not all languages are available on all discs.
- Most discs only have one menu language.

Audio:

You can choose the audio language from this option to your preference.

- Not all languages are available on all discs.
- Some discs do not let you select the audio language using your player's menu. Instead, you have to select the audio language from the disc setup menu (the menu that appears after you insert the disc).

Subtitle:

You can customize your preferred subtitle language in this option.

Note: The unit shuts down automatically in about thirty minutes if it remains idle and no activities are made.

CEC Support:

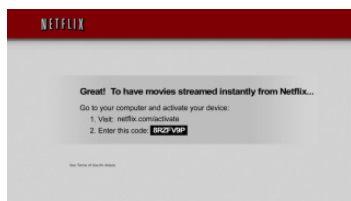

BD-Java

A set of numbers which are assigned to devices participating in a computer network.

JPEG (Joint Photographic Experts Group)

JPEG is a method of compressing still picture files. You can copy JPEG files on BD-RE/-R, DVD-RW/-R, CD-RW/-R or SD Memory Card from a computer and play back the files in this unit.

LAN (Local Area Network)

A group of computer networks covering a small area like a company, school or home.

Local Storage

A storage area of sub contents for playing virtual packages on BD-video.

MP3 (MPEG audio layer 3)

PCM (Pulse Code Modulation)

Router

Sampling Frequency

The rate which sound is measured by a specified interval to turn into digital audio data. The numbers of sampling in one second defines as sampling frequency. The higher the rate, the better the sound quality.

Subnet Mask

A mask which is used to determine what subnet an IP address belongs to.

Title

A collection of chapters on BD-video or DVD-video.

Track

Audio CD use tracks to divide up the content of a disc. The BD-video or DVD-video equivalent is called a chapter. See also "Chapter".

Virtual Package

The function which copies data to other media (local storage) from the Internet and play the secondary video, secondary audio and the subtitle at the same time. The method of the playback varies depending on discs.

Windows Media™ Audio

Windows Media™ Audio is the audio compressing technology developed by Microsoft. You can copy Windows Media™ Audio files on BD-RE/-R, DVD-RW/-R, CD-RW/-R or SD Memory Card from a computer and play them back on this unit.

The precise terms and conditions for copying, distribution and modification follow. Pay close attention to the difference between a "work based on the library" and a "work that uses the library".
